WENT VIRTUAL

Led by our frontline staff and the needs they identified, Healthy Futures rapidly transitioned its program models to virtual strategies.

Our **BAE-B-SAFE** team quickly developed innovative strategies to engage hundreds of young adults through various digital and virtual platforms. These strategies created new avenues for Alamo College Students to engage our programs and access preventive healthcare resources—including contraception—wherever they were sheltering in place. We updated our programs to work virtually, redesigning the core elements to ensure high quality experiences while preserving our message. We even built our very own Zoom Room that has monitors, cameras and microphones to boost our ability to deliver our programs digitally.

BAE-B-SAFE expanded to a **fourth Alamo Community** College. The students at Northeast Lakeview College are now able to access critical education about sex and relationships, and they're supported by the clinical referral network BAE-B-SAFE has honed over its five year tenure. Students there also benefit from Peer Ambassadors, NLC students who are trained by our health educators to deliver programs and referrals to their fellow students.

After a long year of helping the district adopt Big Decisions through virtual presentations to their School Health Advisory Committee and school board more youth will have access to medically accurate sex ed.


