In 2023, the birth rate for Hispanic teens was 3.2 times higher than white teens. This gap decreased to 2.5 times higher in 2024.



Teen Birth Rate per 1,000 Teens Aged 15-19




About teen birth in Wichita County

After several years of decline, the Wichita County teen birth rate increased by 13% in 2024, and now is 28% higher than the Texas rate and 88% higher than the US rate.


In Wichita County, the birth rate for both Hispanic and white teens is significantly higher than the state average.

Non-Health Social Factors

Structural issues such as poverty and lack of access to health care can contribute to teen pregnancy rates.

Health Care Access

In Wichita County there are **23 HTW** providers and 0 FPP providers.

Healthy Texas Women (HTW) and the Family Planning Program (FPP) are statefunded programs that provide access to birth control, screening and treatment for STIs, screening for breast and cervical cancer, and other preventive health care for low income residents.

Sexually Transmitted Infections

Though teen birth rates have declined in recent years, STIs are increasing among Texas youth. Some increase may be due to better screening, but data suggests actual rates are on the rise. A majority of new STI cases in Texas occur in youth aged 15-24. STI rates may not be accurate if people in a certain county are not able to access medical care to be screened for STIs.




Total Syphilis Cases in Wichita County, TX (2007-2023) Number of Cases


